Planning Landscape Plans

Did you know that many town planning applications require landscape plans?


As a general rule, all new developments usually have to submit a landscaping plan with each planning application. Many times the client is unaware that a landscape plan is required until after the architectural plans have been lodged. If this happens, often the condition that a landscape plan must be submitted is added to the Notice of Decision.

The main reason that councils need to see a landscape plan is to ensure that any new development is suitably integrated into the existing environment and neighbourhood character and that there are some permeable surfaces to assist with rainwater infiltration. Most councils are only interested in seeing a planting plan but some are now requesting an illustrative concept also be submitted.

We currently prepare between 20 and 30 such plans a year and have experience with plans for many local government areas.

During construction and if there are later changes to the landscape that have previously been planned and submitted, an amendment must be lodged. This is a step which is overlooked and catches people out at the end of the project. Another issue is that if the ratio of permeable to impermeable surfaces is too low or there is a decrease in the permeability of the surfaces the council may ask for the removal of the installed impermeable surfaces.

We can also assist with the preparation of plans for the approval of greywater treatment systems, tree removal and signage.



MIFGS 2013

In March the Melbourne International Flower and Garden Show (or MIFGS as we know it) wrapped up. Once again, it was a huge show filled with exhibitors with exciting products (new and old!), sculptures, many many visitors, and a high calibre of show gardens and floral exhibits.

Botanical Traditions' very own Ross Uebergang was involved this year in the overall construction and as project manager for a number of gardens produced by his students at Swinburne.

SILVER MEDAL AWARD

One of the gardens designed and constructed by Ross and his students was built to showcase the 35th Victorian Schools Garden Awards. The Victorian School Garden Awards is a program run by the Nursery and Garden Industry Victoria (NGIV) and aims to encourage schools to utilise their grounds and gardens effectively.

The concept behind this design was to symbolise the transition from a traditional "indoor" classroom to an outdoor oasis bursting with habitat, biodiversity, learning and fun. The left side of the garden depicts the "old" style classroom which transitions gradually to an open, outdoor classroom.

Excitingly, this garden was awarded a Silver Medal!
